

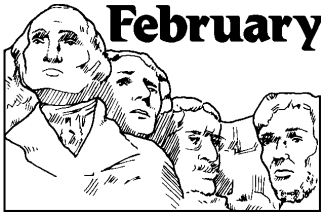

## February

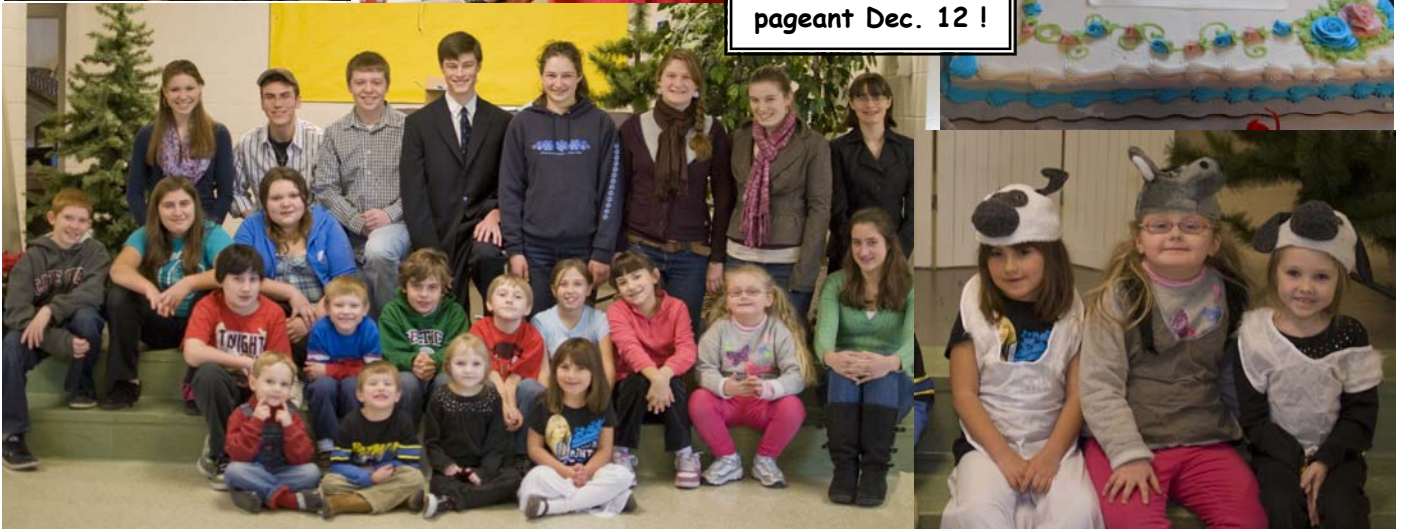
In my January 16, 2011 sermon I told how my oldest daughter has been dealing with the effects of a nasty infection which has only been relatively recently diagnosed. As several have been asking me questions about this, while expressing genuine concern and gracious compassion, I thought I'd summarize the story for all here. Many of you know of Lydia's struggle with all sorts of inexplicable symptoms including movement disorders, occasional vocal tics, temporary loss of language/ability to speak and/or even walk, all of which (*and more*) have been plaguing her off and on since at least a year ago ... on Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2010 (*5 days before her 18<sup>th</sup> birthday*) we rushed her to the hospital by ambulance fearing a stroke, for (*among other things*) her entire right side had gone flaccid, she couldn't speak, and facial features all resembled stroke symptoms. Well, it's been a roller coaster ride through the medical community of Rhode Island and Massachusetts ever since, with several doctors, four different neurologists, two psychiatrists ... none of whom offered any clear diagnosis other than the apparently catch all "conversion disorder" because they could find "nothing wrong." Understandably weary of doctors, Lydia nevertheless needed to have a physical exam for college last August, so we went to a walk-in clinic ... and lo and behold, a wonderfully thorough, personable and competent general practitioner there asked her question after question, actually listened to her answers, and it was soon obvious to us he was (a) taking her seriously (*a refreshingly new experience!*) and (b) knew where he was going with this diagnosis. To make a long story short, he ordered a "SPECT" scan of her head (*a nuclear imaging test*) in December which confirmed there is widespread encephalopathy (*brain disease/inflammation*) which is consistent with a long term, deeply entrenched, well-established infection of Lyme's disease ... and it's quite likely this has been growing for years. The good news is she finally has an accurate diagnosis, and it should be treatable with an intense antibiotic regimen. **Thank you** for your concern, prayers and loving interest.

I told that story in relation to an illustration from C.S. Lewis' Mere Christianity, where he likened the process of our sanctification to an *infection* taking over our minds, hearts and souls. Lewis calls it God's *good infection*; we "catch" this infectious holiness from the presence of Christ Himself. The longer our association with the Holy One, the more we find ourselves responding, behaving, and thinking in ways that display this *good infection* of our spirit ... and part of our calling as a church is to go into the world as His *infectious* representatives, lovingly spreading the good "disease" of holiness wherever we go!

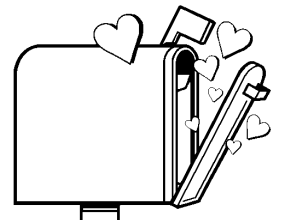
### CHILDREN'S CHURCH

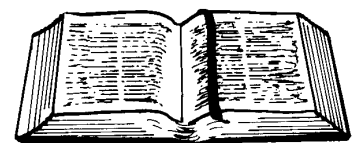

### **Stewardship Campaign 2011**

The number of pledges received to date is up from last year. This is the result of some people pledging for the first time and others returning to pledging. A special *Thank You* to those who have moved away from Rhode Island, but continue to support the programs here at Greenwood.

We have received 137 pledges totaling \$259,312. Of the 137 pledging units, there are 7 new pledges, 49 increased pledges, 68 unchanged pledges, and 13 decreased pledges.

The median pledge for 2011 is \$23.08 per week; half of the pledges are greater than that amount and half are less. This is an increase of \$2.20 over the median pledge from last year. The chart below illustrates our giving for 2011 and is the typical giving pattern in most congregations; 33 giving units (24%) represent 59.0% of our pledged income.

### **Memorial and Endowment Fund**

The Memorial and Endowment Fund was created "to provide a place to conserve all money from memorial gifts, bequests, and other monies specifically designated to this fund to benefit the continuing programs of Greenwood Church." Income from these funds is used as directed by the Trustees to support the programs of the church in many ways. The principal of the fund cannot be used without the approval of a 3/4 vote of the congregation at a congregational meeting of the corporation. Since the fund's creation in 1982, contributions and other receipts transferred to the fund have totaled \$493,809.78.

The Board of Trustees requires the Treasurer to provide a monthly analysis of the Fund's market value to enable the Church to monitor and capture the appreciation from the Fund. As of December 31, 2010, the market value of the fund was \$586,713.13 (over \$92,000 more than the principal). This is \$78,157.54 (15.4%) more than a year ago.

Memorial contributions totaling \$2495 were made during the year. Gifts were given by George Robinson in memory of Norman and Elizabeth Robinson, Marjorie Mair, Dr. Jack Robinson, Faye Burlingaine and Larry Robinson. Other gifts were made in memory of Betty Young, Ann Fraser, Margaret Cady, Constance Pearson, and Florence Harrison. Presbyterian Women also contributed to the Fund.

### **Capital Campaign**

The Capital Campaign continues to receive funds from the congregation from both the fulfillment of pledges made and one time gifts. The Treasurer maintains an accounting of the income and expenditures relative to the capital campaign and the line of credit the church has established in order to make the timely payments necessary for the steeple and sanctuary roof projects which were completed during the year. This campaign is still ongoing and the Stewardship Committee appreciates your continuing support and encourages you to continue to support it as you are able so that we can pay off the line of credit in a timely manner.

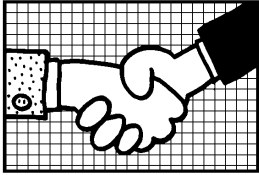
### **2011 Budget**

The Session approved a total budget of \$332,421 which is 4.1% more than last year. Staffing costs were increased by 2.5% to recognize the accomplishments and dedication of our staff. Operations, Utilities, Insurance and Church Programs are being funded at 2010 levels. Directed Mission Giving is being increased by almost 26% which is 9.4% of the operating budget. The Session decided to increase this area of our budget to share the income we received from our investments. We also recognize that most of the Church's activities, funded by all portions of the budget, fall into the broader definition of mission — how we can bring the Word of God to those around us.

In Girl Scouts we sang a song that went, "Make new friends, but keep the old; one is silver and the other gold." Isn't that so true, also, here at Greenwood? This year there are so many friends we have lost. The oldest of these, Ruth Gorton, was member number 148. She joined Greenwood Church on November 11, 1945! When my mother was a deacon back in the 1950's, I remember spending Saturday afternoons helping her and Mrs. Gorton arrange the flowers and set them out with the cross and candlesticks. Back in those days before the sanctuary was built, we had church in what is now Fellowship Hall, and everything had to be taken out and put away again before and after the worship service. Each of the deacons was assigned one or two months of the year. Most of you know Mrs. Gorton as that remarkable 100-year-old lady; it's easy to forget that today's senior citizens used to be the young folks in the church. Looking at it from the other direction, in what will seem like all too short a time, the children in our Sunday School today will become the church leaders of tomorrow. Let's all work together to be sure that they are still active church members, here at Greenwood or wherever they live, when they become adults. It was with great delight that I learned that Melanie Mattis, a member of our Inquirer's class, is the great-granddaughter of Barbara Kendall, another of the deacons with whom my mother served.

Mark your calendars for our next event, a Valentine's Dance on Saturday, February 12, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Our DJs will be Timoli Richardson's sister and brother-in-law, and they are planning an evening that will be fun for all: adults and children, couples and singles. ## **MISSION COMMITTEE**



This edition of the *Fishermen News* is being composed the second week of January. The glow of happiness, coupled with the joy and memories of Greenwood's participation with Angel Tree, continues to leave pleasant thoughts in my heart for both Angel Tree and all of you. I am currently doing the Mission Committee Annual Report, a time of year when we are tasked with reviewing each ministry, considering where cuts or additions should be made. It is truly a balancing act, to be maintained within budget constraints.

Meanwhile, today is Wednesday, Jan 12, the one-year anniversary of Haiti's earthquakes. Emmy Kmet reports that the Mission Committee recently partnered with Exeter Chapel under the World Relief umbrella. They are adopting the community of Lilavois, Haiti. The Lilavois Church began 16 years ago and now has 500 members. In addition to conducting services, the church feeds 200 area children every day. There is also a primary school educating 100 children. Both the church and school were heavily damaged during the earthquake. There is still a lot of trauma from the earthquake and much work to do in the area.

Haiti has declared 1-13-11 as a National Day of Prayer and Fasting. Missionaries are asking Greenwood and other supporting churches to keep them in prayer as they meet and conference with World Relief to decide the next steps. We are all asked to humble ourselves, seeking God's will for Haiti.

World Relief is only one of 21 agencies and specific missionaries we support. The job seems overwhelming each year; yet, the peace and strength of Christ encourages me. Let us all seriously consider what specific purpose God has for Greenwood. We all need to grow; some of us need to lose weight, exercise, turn over a new leaf, etc.; however, what does God want of us?
