Dear Members Co-Owners and Friends,

As I write, the 64th Annual Meeting has adjourned and we are well into our 65th year of ministry. If you were unable to attend, be sure to get a copy of the Annual Report; it provides a wonderful snapshot of the wide and varied ministries of our congregation in 2007. Read closely, and you'll discover some things easily overlooked ... for just one example, do you realize nearly \$100,000 (!) was disbursed through Per Capita, Sunday School, PYF, Presbyterian Women, Deacons, and Mission Committee to the work of mission beyond our local budget expenditures (*which translates to just over 36% of the total disbursed for local budget*)? Thanks to all of you who through your preparation for, participation in and attendance at our Annual Meeting conscientiously demonstrated your sense of "ownership" in the ministry of the church.

Speaking of ownership, I recently read of a large Raleigh, NC church that is doing away with the term "membership." The challenge to those who worship there is to become an *owner*. As explained in their literature, gyms and clubs have members. Such memberships are "... *painless to obtain and even easier to discard.*" An *owner*, on the other hand, takes responsibility to do all he/she can to see the organization succeed. An owner makes the organization happen. They explain, "*Jesus wants His followers to make the church happen -- go out and love people, nurture each other, and serve with your whole life. Ownership is a higher call than membership. Make your church happen! Becoming an owner is a declaration that you are moving from being a consumer to being an investor. What once was the standard for leadership is now our standard for ownership.*"

In a recent article, church "owner" and author Nancy Parsons writes in an endearing way of some of the benefits she and her family receive from their regular church involvement (*article edited for space*):

There is nothing glamorous about Sunday morning in our house. The living room is smeared with half read Sunday papers, the kitchen is cluttered with half-empty cereal bowls, and I often feel a twinge of envy toward my unchurched neighbors. Theirs is a Sunday morning of leisurely coffee and the editorial page. Most of my neighbors are non-churchgoing. It is easier to be that. Why, then, is our family different?

For one thing, my husband and I both grew up in churchgoing families. But even in those days, it would have been easier to stay home. The Sunday mornings of my husband's and my childhood were no easier than our present pattern. Even then churchgoing wasn't easy. But regardless of inconvenience, burdened with our audio visual aids and our church school texts, our music, and sometimes cake plates and bean pots, our families went to church.



Churchgoing is a habit, brought to our adulthood and our shared life. A habit, yes. But that word can't bear the responsibility for our present church attendance. We could easily exchange the churchgoing habit for the habit of Sunday morning self-indulgence. We go to church so we won't feel guilty? Hardly. We aren't paying off a heavy conscience. What we feel when we don't go to church is an *absence*.

Our relatives are available only on planned-for occasions. Our friends tend to be reflections of ourselves with similar ages, educations, and interests. Our church, on the other hand, is more diverse -- at its best it is a cross section of people all mixed together and functioning as a Christian community. Our local church, like its individual families, has homely concerns of kitchen and budget. It needs the work and time of those involved and we sometimes must admit that our church work is as frustrating and tiresome as the chores we are called on to assume at home. But we are bound to that work by the same things that bind families ... concern with each other's welfare. If we valued just the sense of community, a country club or Kiwanis just might adequately serve us. But we view the church -- at least most of the time -- as an example of functioning Christianity whose values we affirm.

My husband and I expect the church to reinforce what we try to teach and live at home. If the morals of society seem nebulous, the church at least offers a setting larger than the family where the Christian ethic is practiced, and if the church falls short of the mark **we share the responsibility** to right the balance. The church family reinforces within itself a concern for the spiritual, emotional, and material welfare of its members. Infant baptism is a case in point. I enter very seriously, yet joyfully, into that moment when the pastor asks the congregation to share responsibility for the Christian nurture of a baby.

Sometimes in the fellowship hall after a service I will catch sight of a child running, giggling, set free finally from his church-school class, and it will seem just last month that the child was an infant and I was promising to share in the child's Christian upbringing. I observe the youngster's happiness with pleasure and am moved to remember the times my husband and I stood at the baptismal and heard at our backs the congregation affirming their responsibility for our children.

We moved recently, and in a new state, in a new town, have started to find our way into another church family. We miss our old one, familiar faces and friends with whom our lives were involved. After the services, some people stop to grip our hands, ask our names, and offer theirs. Strange faces and names blur, but that doesn't matter. The important thing is we are being made welcome. Even in a new place, we have a sense of being home.

Owners make the organization happen. Owners participate heart and soul in the life and work of the organization, week in and week out, because they've a vested interest in the health of the organization. And owners reap benefits from their investments in a way nominal members will never know.

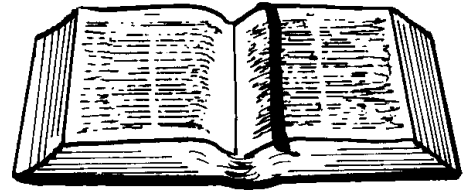

Letters from Supported Missionaries

Greg and Chris Callison: *First we want to again thank you for the love and support you have shown us, and for your many prayers, especially for Chris during her trial with breast cancer. As you know, the operation was successful and now all of the reports regarding the possible spread of the cancer have come back negative, including the bone report. She is healing well, and astonishingly has remarked that, "Pulling a tooth would have hurt more!"*

Chris' operation reports, as they came in, were each encouraging. And then Chris' sister, Jeannie, joined us for 72 hours, coming all the way from San Jose, California on a free ticket. Coincidentally, the last time Jeannie visited Chris in Germany, 34 years ago, Chris was also in the hospital after a bad car accident, though neither trip was planned knowing that in advance. The good Lord knew, however, how important Chris' family is to her. So from healing and health to family and friends, we were unusually aware of our blessings. We hope you were as aware of them too.

The doctors gave us the green light to visit my brother, his wife, and their 12-year-old daughter (whom I have never met!) in the Philippines over Christmas. Chris' radiation therapy begins in January. That is something for which we would appreciate continued prayers. Thankfully, chemotherapy will not be necessary.

Walter and LouAnne Copeland: *Happy New Year! Our days were full leading up to Christmas. We were pleased that 45 kids came to our first Children's Christmas program in this church along with about 10 parents. The Christmas service and Candlelight service also saw new people from the community. On December 24, we drove to the mountain town of Karuizawa to help out with the distribution of Christmas tracts to all of the people that were touring the area to see the illumination. Our Christian conference facility, Megumi Chalet, was full of people milling around enjoying the lights and listening to Japan's first Singing Christmas tree. Later on the big chapel was packed with people for the Candlelight Service. We pray that many hearts were touched that day to know more. An added blessing is having Christina home. We spent a quiet Christmas day in a little cabin in the woods with snow on the ground. We'll miss her as she leaves to go back to college.*

Copelands' prayer requests: 1) We have been told that a pastor is not available this year. Although we're disappointed, we know that God has everything under control. We are beginning to pursue other options such as retired missionaries that might be able to come for a short period. There may be a retired Japanese pastor that may be available. Thank you for praying for this critical need. 2) We still feel the need to go this April on home assignment (furlough). As you can imagine, there are many things to do in preparation before leaving. We look forward to seeing you this year!
