Dear Members and Friends,

At the close of worship a few hours ago, the last person in line patiently waiting to greet me was a grateful and courteous (*and tall!*) Frank Hurd. On Tuesday, he leaves for Myrtle Beach to participate in the Summer Beach Project of Campus Outreach, and he wanted to express his genuine appreciation for the financial and prayer support he is receiving from the church for this mission endeavor. The Deacons (*through their PPYF program*) and the Mission Committee have contributed to his support. Below is Frank's letter to potential supporters (*slightly edited for space*) and an excerpt from the Campus Outreach website:



Last summer I made a decision to explore my faith in more depth. Though I have always considered myself a Christian, I realized I didn't know enough about my faith and about the life of Jesus Christ. It was then I began reading the Bible on a daily basis to learn about what I felt I should have already known. In the midst of my quest to become a better and more spiritual person, I found myself in an entirely new environment at Elon University in North Carolina. The Lord blessed me and I met a Campus Outreach leader who invited me to their weekly gatherings. I soon found myself surrounded by young Christians seeking the same spiritual goals as me. As I continued to learn more about God and how He wants us to live, I realized the need to communicate God's will to others. I believe participating in Summer Beach Project will benefit my life and I pray it will also benefit the lives of others who God might speak to through me. Prayerful or any kind of support will be wonderful. I hope you are as excited about this opportunity as I am! Sincerely, Frank Hurd.

Summer Beach Project (SBP) is an 8 week training opportunity held in Myrtle Beach where students live, play, work, and learn along side other college students. Each student works a full-time job during the day and participates in evangelistic outreaches, Bible studies, leadership development, discipleship groups, ministry training and other activities during the week. This schedule is challenging for the purpose of helping students grow in their relationship with Christ, and develop ministry skills and leadership qualities. Besides working a job and being involved in project activities, students will be worshipping and working with area churches, giving students an opportunity to learn and serve in the context of a local church. The sponsor, Campus Outreach, is an interdenominational ministry to college students across the southeast. Campus Outreach Charlotte is a ministry of Christ Covenant Church in Matthews, NC.

Our prayers go with you, Frank, as you embark on this ministry adventure. It's hard to believe it's been seven years since you passed through Confirmation class! May God bless you in this endeavor.

While on the subject of being blessed, I was most pleased by the **26** selfless and eager-to-serve volunteers who showed up to graciously give of their time to make our recent **All Church Work Day** such a success. songs and crafts. Please fill out a registration form found in Fellowship Hall and return to the church office or in the offering plate by June 14 so we can get our gear in order!

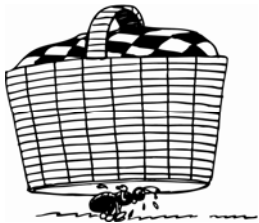

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

***“Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving.”
(Colossians 3:32,24)***

The church needs to make two major expenditures: Steeple repair and front roof replacement in 2009 (estimated at \$55,000) and sanctuary roof replacement in 2010 (estimated at \$110,000).

In light of the current challenge in funding the operating budget, the Session is recommending the establishment of a separate Capital Campaign with contributions to be received over a five year period.

Because of the need to complete these two projects totaling over \$165,000 in the next 18 months, the Session is recommending the use of a line of credit loan in order to insure the timely payment of obligations. The use of a line of credit loan will allow us to borrow the money as needed and repay it as soon as funds are available.

The Session is recommending the use of a portion of the Memorial & Endowment Fund as the collateral for the line of credit loan. The use of a line of credit loan will maintain the principle plus income of the Memorial & Endowment Fund and allow the Investment Committee to continue managing this fund with a long term outlook. The requirements for using a portion of the Memorial & Endowment Fund as collateral for a Line of Credit Loan are the same as for spending the principle of the fund.

When the decision was made to fund the two major projects over a five year period, it became necessary to project what other projects might need to be funded outside the operating budget during the next five years to determine what the total funding requirements will be so that plans can be put in place to meet them.

Please attend one or more of the several meetings being planned to present more detailed information and receive feedback. The meetings will occur prior to the June 21st Meeting of the Congregation. Notice of the meeting times and locations will be provided in a timely manner. One of the meetings is Sunday, June 7, at 10:00 AM.

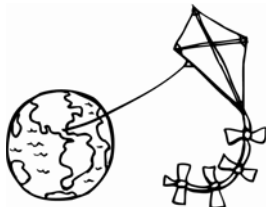

MIKE-EE’S MUSINGS

Many of you have read the Rev. Bill and Elizabeth Silbert’s “Love Story” which has been posted on the Presby bulletin board in Fellowship Hall, but there are more love-related Silbert stories to tell.

More than twenty years ago Mike-ee and Bill Silbert served on the Committee on Ministry representing the Presbytery of Southern New England. Every month they carpoled to committee meetings in Connecticut or on triennial visitations to churches. On one occasion to break the monotony of silent travel time, Bill asked Mike-ee about his previous church affiliation. Bill had never been exposed to such a religious rarity—a Presbyterian Polak. So Mike-ee unreeled the story. At age 12 he walked two miles each week to attend catechism classes at the Boystown Parmadale Orphanage in Parma, Ohio (the “southern sunroom of greater Cleveland”). Mike-ee enjoyed the exposure to Fr. Gallagher who was always involved in the sports activities at the orphanage and who issued Mike-ee his First Communion certificate.

Mike-ee became the rare Presbyterian species when he married Donna Wilgus in early 1942. Upon discharge from the Air Force in 1945, he managed a large appliance and supply shop at the county seat in Tuscola, Illinois. Directly across Main Street from Mike-ee’s store was the First Presbyterian Church of Tuscola where he served as deacon and secretary of the adult club and sang in the choir.

The pastor had been a chaplain in the Marine Corp during WWII. Both he and Mike-ee had served in combat zones during the war and a close kinship evolved twixt Mike-ee and Pastor Roger McShane. Bill Silbert listened intently as Mike-ee drove the car and related history, and his eyes lit up like a Christmas tree when he heard the words ‘Roger McShane’! He had attended Princeton Theological Seminary with Roger from 1938 to 1942. Roger had been dating the young lady who later became Mrs. William Silbert. Mike-ee accused Bill of stealing his preacher’s girlfriend, Elizabeth.

In 1948, when Mike-ee was about to depart for Rhode Island, church members urged Roger to pay Mike-ee a visit and convince him to stay with the parish. Knowing that Roger had been pursuing a PhD in Ancient and Medieval History for a few years at the University of Illinois, Mike-ee sensed that Roger was not considering Tuscola a permanent roosting place. So he challenged McShane to sign a mutual agreement that both would stay for at least five years—they both lost.
